# ISAAC MYERS - (1774-1860)

Nothing is known of the early life of Isaac Myers, our forebear, before he left South Carolina with his wife and four young sons and began his long arduous journey to the wild, unsettled region of the Mississippi Territory, landing at Natchez early in 1816. It is believed that his parents were German, coming to America by way of Switzerland. He was married to Gracie Leah Butler, daughter of John and Elizabeth Butler, of Fayette District, Sampson County, North Carolina. Also coming to Mississippi were Gracie's brothers and sisters, Mary (Polly) m Phillip Magee, Samuel, Penelope m Asa Mangum; and Henry L. Butler. Descendants of these pioneers live in and near Magee in great numbers today.

We have learned something of the arrival of Isaac Myers in the Natchez District from the writings of the late T. L. Mendenhall, found in the bound copies of the Westville News, 1900 - 1907, in the Chancery Clerk's office at Mendenhall, Miss. In the May 3, 1900 issue we find under, "Reminiscences of Simpson County. Historical Events That Happened 70 Years Ago," written by T. L. Mendenhall, this very interesting and enlightening account:

"In 1820, John Berry, the grand and the great grandfather of present generations of the same name, moved from Marion County and settled on Silver Creek, between where Albert Gallatin and Abner Wilkes Berry live. The line dividing Marion County from Lawrence County ran through John Berry's dwelling, enabling him to eat breakfast in one county and retire at night in another. He there succeeded in rearing a large family - all of whom have since died except Richard T. Berry, now a resident of Lawrence County."

"One of his neighbors, Isaac Myers, resided in Lawrence County, though he resided south of the line, where W. M. Bridges now lives.

Immigrating from Tennessee in 1818 he came down the Mississippi River in a flatboat and landed at Natchez. He then had a wife and one son\* and brought with him all his worldly effects, and he either brought with him or procured at Natchez a horse and cart, his only means of transporting his family, goods and chattels. Thus equipped and prepared he set out on what was then called the Natchez and St. Stevens Road, which was a very dim trail, having been traveled but very little and was principally followed by blazes on the trees.

The country being so sparsely settled, there were no hands to open roads or build bridges. Consequently, he had considerable difficulty crossing some of the streams, but being a stout, robust and athletic man with an iron will and considerable experience in the use of tools, he deviated from the blazed pathway, and like Noah's dove in search of land whereupon to set his foot where he could be monarch of all he surveyed, he settled the above described lands and set about building a house for himself.

When he landed there, his exchequer was reduced to one silver dollar which has been seen by this writer since the Civil War and found to have a very ancient appearance as it was worn almost smooth and the dates and inscriptions were entirely obliterated.

The skill that Mr. Myers exhibited in the construction of his house of rough hewn materials, attracted the attention of other immigrants who were less qualified for this kind of work, and for a considerable time after he had located his family he was almost constantly employed in assisting others in building, frequently several miles from his home, thus enabling him to purchase a few head of cattle and hogs from which he continued to raise stock without any attention on his part except to mark and to brand, as they were looked after and kept from going wild by his estimable and industrious wife. In a few years' time he had quite a number of beef cattle to dispose of, which was an annual source of income and when it had increased sufficiently, he commenced purchasing slaves and land etc.

He resided in this place and continued to increase his property until the winter of 1851. He then moved to Rankin County and settled between Richland and Tumbalo Creeks, four miles south of Brandon, where he died somewhere above 80 years of age. Prior to his death, he had accumulated about a hundred slaves and a large tract of land and a considerable amount of other property. His only son now resides in Covington County. He had two daughters, one was the mother of B. F. Berry and the other was the mother of A. J. Ragland."

when he landed at Natchez in 1818, Isaac's will listed seven sons born before 1818, namely: John, Asa, Henry, William, Calvin, Chapman, Carmen, while Samuel was born in Lawrence County in 1818. Three other children were born to Isaac and Gracie Myers in Lawrence County. They were: Elizabeth, born 1820/ m Pryor Berry; Mary Jane, born 1823/ m Bill Ragland and Alvin(Alvie), born 1827.

All of these children are found listed in the Mississippi census records with the names of their children except Samuel and John. They removed to Texas where the names of their descendants were not found until 1966. Then, a descendant of Samuel was found and his record brought up to date and added to this book.

Isaac Myers was found listed for the last time in Lawrence County in 1850 and for the first time in Rankin County in 1860, although he was probably living in Rankin much sooner. Perhaps as Mr. Mendenhall said, as early as 1851. He was 74 years old in 1851 and his property holdings were considerably reduced. However, a report of his assets at the time of his death gave the number of acres of land as nineteen hundred and sixty (1,960.) and the amount received for the sale thereof as \$1,151.00. From the sale of his personal property, \$2,981.00 ; from the sale of his 62 slaves, \$69,974.00 (Rather the appraisal of the slaves for they were divided among the ten surviving children and the wife, Gracie). The total amount of the value of his estate amounted to \$74,429.00.

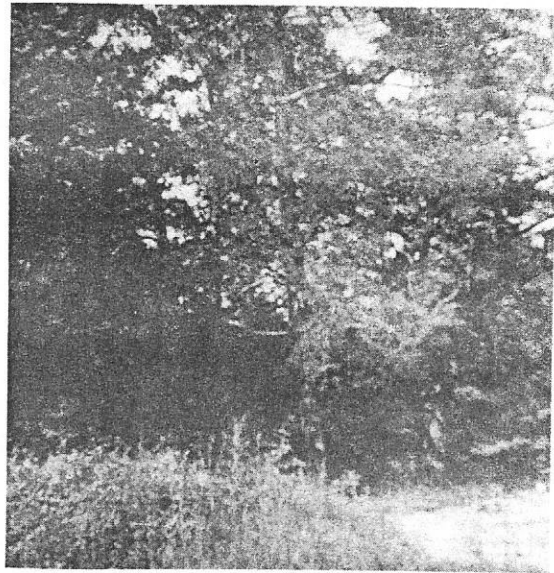
Isaac died at the age of 86 years.

It is believed that Isaac and Gracie Myers are buried in the Dry Creek Cemetery, for the gravestone of their daughter, Mary Jane Ragland who died only two months before her mother may be seen there today, and their son Carmen and his family are buried there. Two weatherworn stones, without names or dates could be markers for the graves of Isaac and Gracie Myers.

#### THE HOME OF ISAAC AND GRACIE MYERS IN RANKIN COUNTY BEFORE 1860.

The last home of Isaac and Gracie was located in Rankin County about 4 miles south of Brandon, between Richalnd and Tumbalo Creeks, on the Brandon-Westville Road (now Brandon-Star Road) and became known after Isaac's death as the "Ragland Place" because of the fact that it was bought by Bill Ragland, husband of Mary Jane Myers, at public auction when the place was put up for sale at the time of Isaac's death in 1860. It is assumed that the Ragland family moved in with Gracie where they shared the home for only two years for mother and daughter both died in the same year, 1862 - Mary Jane expiring May 3, at the age of 36 years and Gracie in July, at the age of 82.

A clump of drooping cedar trees and the remains of a chimney are all that mark the spot where the plantation home of these people once stood. The original frame structure stood for many years after the Civil War and the freeing of the slaves . It was a typical antebellum home with rooms on each side of an open hallway and a brick kitchen set apart from the main house. Two cisterns furnished water . A number of "outhouses" dotted the back yard for a special one was needed for the many activities that took place on a plantation such as this. The farm was almost a little "kingdom", complete in itself, with facilities for supplying almost every need.

As Cliff and I stood on the rise of ground where the house had been and gazed away to the west, we could visualize the wide fields as they had once stretched out across the rich bottoms of Richland Creek; fields once dotted with slaves hard at work in the cotton and corn, supervised by a mounted overseer, as the aged Isaac sat on a shaded knoll and reviewed the long way he had come since he had left his home in South Carolina. Now that he had long passed his allotted three score and ten years of life, he had time for reminiscing. He had time to think of his father - and his mother - and his brothers, one of whom had come with him to the Mississippi Territory, while two others (Abraham and Jacob, according to legend) had pressed further west, to Texas and even beyond until they were swallowed up in oblivion. Genealogists believe that the John Myers (1775-1840) whose grave we found in the Sheridan Myers Cemetery, in Lawrence County was his brother and that the Hannah Myers (1740-1828) whose grave is near by, probably was the mother of Isaac and John.

How we wished that we could have recorded all the information Isaac had stored in his mind during his long eventful lifetime! Of his ancestors whom we never knew, of the relatives and other pioneers who were his companions during the early days when the State of Mississippi was in the making. How we wanted to know something of his wife, Gracie and her family back in South Carolina. Isaac probably kept some kind of a record of his family and ancestors for a time, but eventually they fell into hands that did not appreciate their worth and that allowed them to be destroyed. These records, if existing today, could not be bought with any amount of money.

#### MYERS SLAVE DESCENDANTS

By an odd coincidence we found descendants of the slaves of Isaac Myers still living on the land their ancestors had cultivated, although they, themselves were not aware of that fact. Behind the grove of cedars where Isaac's house has stood, another modest house had been built to house the descendants of Willis Myers, a great, great grandson of the late Willis who was allotted to Isaac's widow, Gracie upon the settlement of the estate in 1860 after Isaac's death. In the report of the commissioners appointed to divide the slaves we find this notation:

#### VETERAN OF 1812

In time, Isaac came to own vast acreage in counties Lawrence, Simpson, Scott and Rankin, much of which was obtained as bounty lands to which he was entitled as a veteran of the war with Great Britain in 1812, having served under the command of Col. Nixon in the Mississippi Militia. His application for this land was filed with the Dep't of Interior, Pension Office, in Washington City, D.C. in 1856.

In order to be eligible for bounty lands a person had to be a citizen of the United States and it is presumed this explains Isaac's naturalization in 1845, although it does not explain why he was recorded as a native of South Carolina in all the censuses.

JOHN MYERS - first born of Isaac Myers and Gracie Butler Myers, was born in South Carolina about 1800 and came with his parents and five young brothers to the Mississippi Territory, Natchez District about 1815 where he lived until he was grown, marrying in 1823, Elizabeth Fortenberry, daughter of Jacob Fortenberry, of Lawrence County, Miss: He moved with his wife and three children to Texas before the death of his father, Isaac Myers, before 1860 and no trace of a descendant was found at the time of the settling of his father's estate although a search was made at the time. Notices were published in the Brandon Republican for four weeks, running from 13 September to 13 October, 1866, citing all persons interested in the estate of Isaac Myers to appear at the court house in Brandon, but no word was received from any member of John's family. No mention was made of John in the will. How many children John And Elizabeth had in Texas is not known to this writer and only the names of the three children born in Mississippi have been found. They are : William, John and Gracy.as follows:

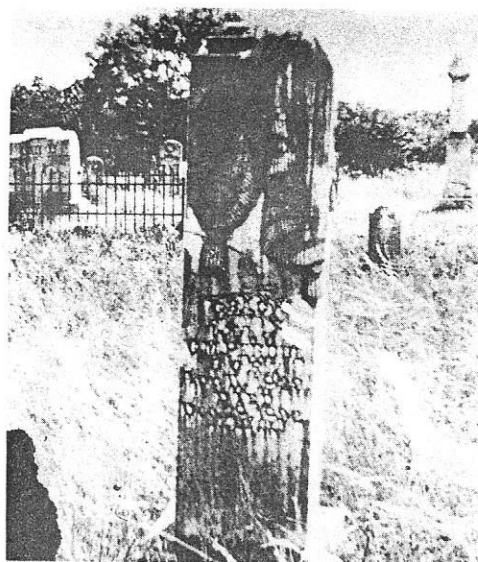

Her second husband was George McCutcheon Perdue, married June 18, 1861, Freestone, Texas, born 7/18/1838 in Alabama, died 12/2/1889, Honey Creek, near Hico, Hamilton County, Texas, son of George M. Perdue, of Georgia and Mary F. ? of North Carolina, buried in Honey Creek Cemetery. Six children were born to this couple as follows: Baylor, James, Sarah, Gracy, George Jr., and Linnie Perdue. A. John W. Dunagan - born November 12, 1846 in Mississippi, enlisted and served in Civil War with step-father, was captured at Vicksburg but did not return to Texas after his release.

B. Lucy Elizabeth Dunagan - born January 17, 1849, died at age 10 as result of an accident.

C. Alice Jane Dunagan (Miller ) - born August 12, 1852, Tehuacana, Limestone County, Texas; died December 23, 1912, in Corsicana, Navarro County, Texas; married April 8, 1868, Freestone County, Texas, Teodor (Theodor)(Tedor) Miller, born March 18, 1844, Prussia; died April 1, 1909, Oakland, Oregon, son of John Miller and Dora Hudzietz Miller, both born in Prussia. Sailed from Bremen on board Scoonerbrig Magnet , landed at Galveston, Texas. This family moved to Hamilton County in 1880, along with Alice Jane Dunagan's mother, Gracie Myers Dunagan Perdue, and her family and her Perdue in-laws. The family moved to Oregon in 1886, Baylor Perdue went along, lived one year in Yoncalla then moved to Oakland, Oregon.

Following the death of her husband, Alice Jane Dunagan Miller went to Texas to visit her brother, half-brothers and half - sisters, then made her home with her son, Charles B. Miller until her death.

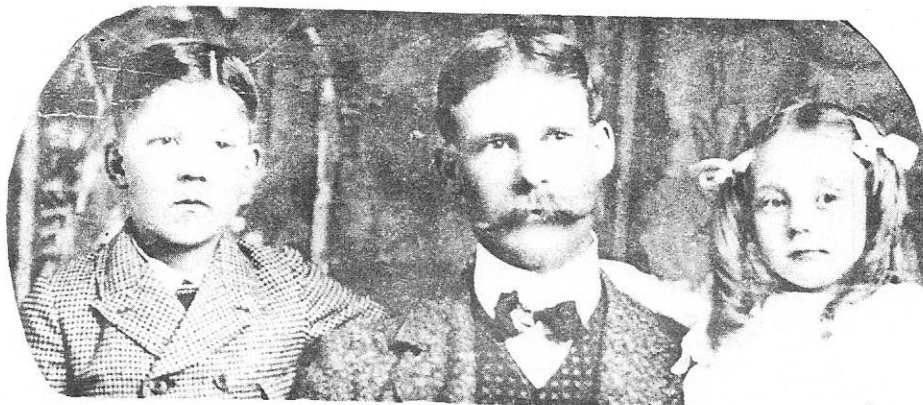
Two of Charles Miller's uncles married two of Annie L. Hammett's aunts. They met at the Freestone County Confederate Reunion grounds.

Charles Miller was a railroad telegrapher and lived in many states including Louisiana, Kansas, Oregon and Texas several different times. He was a sergeant in the Spanish American War and stayed in Manila, Philippine Islands for a year following his discharge. In 1912 he went to work for the Magnolia Petroleum Company, of Corsicana, Texas and moved to Dallas with that company in 1914. He later worked in the Ranger Oil field and for the last twenty years worked for the Lone Star Gas Company in accounting and taxes. He was an assistant treasurer at the time of his death. 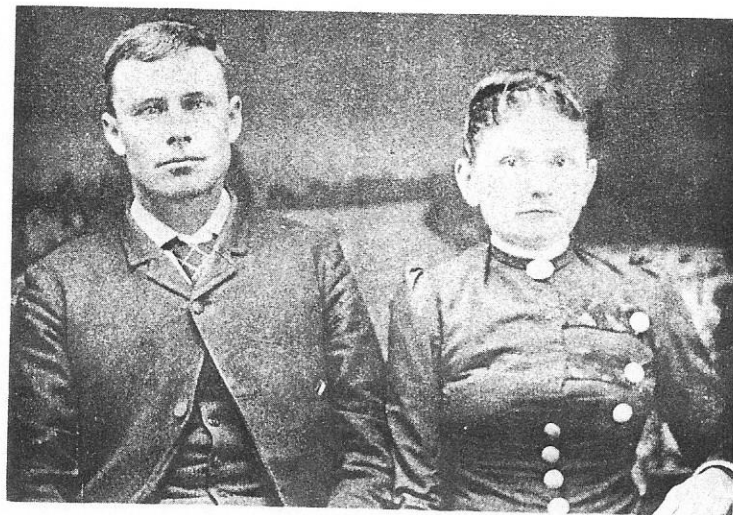

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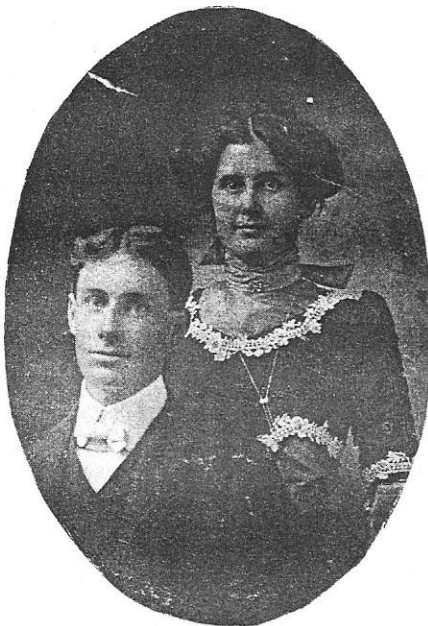
